**Comments: (such as, notable birds seen, interesting bird or animal behavior, condition of the birding site, participant comments):** I believe "Mother Nature" rewarded us with some nice birds and nature to see. We had a Great Blue Heron put on a show where it initially caught a big fish for breakfast. We watched in amazement as when he tried to swallow it, he dropped it and frantically searched for it, he fortunately got it back and swallowed it. We also had a surprise visit by an Otter who was also fishing in the same area as the Great Blue Heron. The Heron was not happy about that but there wasn't much it could do. However, as the Otter went fishing under water it inadvertently pushed some fish towards the Great Blue Heron and we watched it catch at least 2 more fish while the Otter did not catch any. The Otter then moved further upstream. Even though lots of our most colorful warblers and other songbirds have gone south, I believe we did pretty well on Saturday to see what we did. Some of highlights include: a Swamp Sparrow, a Red-headed Woodpecker (juvenile), Ruby-crowned Kinglet, A Yellowrumped Warbler, and the 5 Rusty Blackbirds. While the Rusty Blackbirds are not rare in our area, they are rare to see, mostly because of where they tend to be in wetlands and marches. See photos:
